INTENDED AUDIENCE & SCOPE OF PRACTICE

This program is intended for primary care physicians, psychologists, nurses, nurse practitioners, physician's assistants, social workers and other interested health professionals who diagnose, treat and manage Alzheimer's disease and related disorders in diverse populations.

STATEMENT OF NEED

The Alzheimer's Association estimates that there are 5.3 million Americans with Alzheimer's disease affecting the lives of 9.9 million unpaid caregivers. There is a new case of Alzheimer's disease every 70 seconds, and it is currently the 6th leading cause of death. In the future, Alzheimer's disease is expected to have significant effects on the social and economic structure of our country. There is an increasing need for medical professionals as well as policymakers to address the specter of an increasing prevalence of Alzheimer's disease in an aging society.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

The goal of this conference is to improve the diagnostic and therapeutic capability of healthcare providers who care for persons with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. Following this conference, the participant will be able to do the following:

- Describe the rationale and results of the REVEAL Study, a randomized trial of the psychological and behavioral impact of APOE disclosure in first degree relatives of persons with Alzheimer's disease
- Describe the evidence for and against the use of statins in the treatment and prevention of Alzheimer's disease.
- Create effective interventions for individuals with dementia based on their specific abilities that are relatively spared.
- Summarize current controversies related to the effect of hormones on cognition and risk for Alzheimer's disease.
- Review the diagnostic criteria and distinguishing features of non-Alzheimer's disease dementias.
- Recognize, evaluate and manage depression in patients with Alzheimer's disease and their caregivers
- Review clinically useful tools to assess the function of persons with dementia and use information obtained from these assessments to support performance and help manage disruptive behaviors.
